Home Mods for a Home Base

odd Gladfelter and Cindy Ross may be the two most interesting people in East Brunswick, Pennsylvania. Nearly 40 years ago as a young couple in their 20s—without any construction experience—they built their forever home, a two-story log cabin, in the middle of the woods using raw trees and salvaged, recycled materials. Together they've hiked thousandsupon-thousands of miles, including a few rugged 500-mile treks across the Rocky Mountains with llamas carrying their two (now adult) children as toddlers. Individually, they're both well-respected artists; Cindy is a painter, writer, and author of several books, and Todd is a chainsaw wood

sculptor. Among the busyness of their homestead life, they still find time to serve their local community through volunteer projects and founded their own nonprofit to support veterans recovering from post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). With all their many adventures and accomplishments, the least fascinating thing about them

is their experience navigating life-altering injuries. In 2021 Todd slipped off the roof of his workshop, shattered his C3-C5 vertebrae, became paralyzed, and now lives with quadriplegia.

The diagnosis felt like a jarring blow; doctors said Todd would never walk again. He spent over a month in an intensive in-patient rehabilitation facility before transitioning home with a short nine weeks of in-home therapy and nursing care. "It was wicked hard coming home; that was the hardest thing I think of the whole accident," shared Ross. "In, in-patient [therapy] you have everything—nurses and every therapist helping; [then] you come home and it's like 'here we are, we're on our own.""

Cindy became Todd's full-time caregiver in a home unprepared to meet his accessibility needs. Everything in the home they built together 40 years prior—was customized; from their small narrow hallways and the terracotta tile throughout their kitchen, to their in-ground, step down bathtub. Cindy and Todd, with support from family and friends, navigated Todd's mobility challenges one day at time: including finding ways to transfer Todd to and from his 300-pound wheelchair throughout their home. "It was tough, that was the toughest part trying to figure it all out." shared Ross.

Adventurers at-heart, the two are no strangers to perseverance even in the most challenging of circumstances, and they were determined to not let this "slip" keep them from the people,

> places, and the lifestyle they loved. Not long after Todd's transition home, the couple connected with Inglis' Home Modifications for Independence (HMI) program, and met Lynn Stewart-Krieger, **Environmental Accessibility** Specialist, who came out and conducted an assessment at their cabin to determine

what modifications would be available to them.

"One of the things Todd was very adamant about was [that] he wanted to be able to get to the back of his house safely and be outside," shared Stewart-Krieger. "The other thing was the bathroom."

With support from an HMI grant, funded by the Craig H. Neilsen Foundation, the Program was able to install a ramp on Cindy and Todd's back porch and make renovations to their bathroom including a raised toilet, grab bars, and a hydraulic tub lift— without impacting the feel or aesthetic of their log cabin home. Best of all, the renovations

played a key role in helping the couple get closer to reconnecting with the life and activities they enjoyed prior to the accident.

While the ramp provided access to the back of the cabin, it also became a significant tool in Todd's physical therapy and his ability to regain a skill his doctors said he never would—the ability to walk. Using the ramp and a treadmill on the back porch that they retrofitted with a harness, Todd and Cindy were able to duplicate some of the therapies Todd was receiving at Good Shepherd Rehabilitation at home and increase his recovery time and mobility. Over several months Todd began trading his electric wheelchair for a walker, and over a couple of years he has gone from walking only a few inches to a few hundred feet with minimal assistance. Their now-accessible bathroom has also aided in Todd's ability to use the bathroom without assistance and given Cindy the opportunity to leave home for longer stretches of time with peace of mind—knowing that Todd can navigate their home more independently again. As Todd continues his recovery, the couple have found new ways to engage in their life-long passions. Todd has regained enough strength on the left side of his body to operate a small handheld chainsaw and started carving owls and turtles again. He's also learned to operate and ride an adapted mountain bike-trike. This year the couple, together with friends, have set out on their latest adventure—tackling the 3,700-mile Great American Rail-Trail from Pennsylvania to the west coast of Washington state. Along the way they're raising awareness about accessible trails and the positive impact that nature and getting outdoors can have on anyone's healing journey. While Todd and Cindy's "road to recovery" is far from over, neither are their adventures.

A Place to Call Home: How Inglis is Building Up Communities Amidst the Pennsylvania Housing Crisis

nnually, Inglis and our Self-Determination Housing of Pennsylvania program host a conference that brings together thought leaders, change makers, advocates, and legislators from across the State to support each other through one of the biggest challenges we face as a community—affordable, accessible housing.

In Pennsylvania alone, 79% of all housing units across the State were built before the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) went into law; and currently there is an estimated shortage of 267,0000 affordable housing units for extremely low-income renters. The cost of housing for both renters and homeowners continues to rise; with nearly 50% of renters and 20% of homeowners now spending more than 30% of their income on housing expenses. As the state population continues to age, a significant portion of Pennsylvania households are also classified as "ALICE:" asset limited, income constrained, and employed; meaning they earn above the poverty level but not enough to afford basic needs, including housing. The Commonwealth is also at risk of losing over 20,000 publicly-supported rental homes, with another 12,000 units of public



housing desperately in need of investments for upgrades and remodels. The urgency to create and sustain affordable, accessible housing grows higher every day—especially in rural areas of the State. So how is Inglis making a difference?

By bridging the connection gap.

Each year Inglis' housing conference, Opening Doors Together, connects networks of housing developers, contractors, provider agencies, non-profits, and local municipality organizations with the resources that prioritize, expand, and support the creation of accessible, affordable across Pennsylvania and beyond. Inglis continues to foster partnerships not only for itself, but for the organizations throughout the Commonwealth that equally value and advocate for more inclusive communities. It is through the power of connection and by creating spaces to help drive sustainable change —that we can ensure that one day everyone will have a place to call home.

In August the 2025 Opening Doors Together conference engaged nearly 200 guests over two days in Harrisburg, PA. This year's Conference featured thought provoking keynotes from Gary Gilliam, a former NFL player and entrepreneur in the housing industry, PA Department of Human Services Secretary Dr. Val Arkoosh, and PA Department of Community and Economic Development Secretary Rick Siger; as well as 14 breakout sessions led by various innovators from across the housing and disability sectors.

Anwesha Dutta: One Ray of Hope Warming Thousands of Hearts

bout twelve years ago, Anwesha was introduced to Inglis through a volunteer gift-wrapping day. What began as a simple act of kindness quickly became what can only be described as "the gift that keeps on giving"—every day, within the Inglis community, throughout the Philadelphia metro area, and beyond.

As a board member for almost a decade, Anwesha has made many valuable contributions. However, the most inspiring aspects of her story come from her role as artistic director for the Nava Nritya Dance Academy (NNDA) and co-founder of the Ray of Hope International Foundation. In very personal ways, Anwesha has made an impact by marrying her passion for the art of Indian dance and her devotion to making a direct contribution to programs that have a strong social impact at home and in India.

For more than 12 years, Anwesha's Ray of Hope Foundation has supported the Inglis Assistive

Technology Solutions program and Inglis' Innovation Centers. Through dedicated annual fundraisers, the foundation has granted tens of thousands of dollars, helping people with disabilities gain access to the technology and services necessary to live independently. Just as impactful as the funding is Anwesha's passion for spreading awareness not only of what we do, but the need for it and the power of every person to contribute.

"My nephew said it best when he said, 'All of us can lift our hands and hold the phone—imagine if you couldn't.' More than the funds, just being aware of what a disability is and how it affects the people around us is so important."

Anwesha has instilled this awareness in both her family and the NNDA community. Through her own example, she's motivated youth and adults to volunteer with fundraising and education. At NNDA's annual recital alone, they bring about 800 attendees into awareness of Inglis' mission and encourage a shared purpose supporting inclusion for their neighbors living with disabilities.

"The humility in meeting people where they are. The empowerment. The emotional connections. They really stand out. Everything is about community. Inglis is very unique. There is no other organization like this."

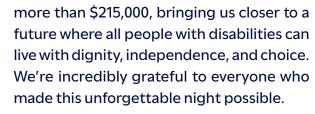

Inglis Honors Courage and Commitment at the 2025 BASH

At this year's BASH, we proudly honored two remarkable leaders whose unwavering grit and bold action are making a real difference in Philadelphia and beyond. Ed Dunfee received our Game Changer Award, and Habitat for Humanity Philadelphia was recognized with our Pioneer Award.



Ed Dunfee's journey is a powerful testament to resilience and reinvention. A longtime Philadelphia resident and Navy veteran, Ed's life took a dramatic turn in 2016 when a massive heart attack and sepsis led to the amputation of both legs and paralysis. Despite these challenges, Ed refused to let loss define him. Moving into Inglis Apartments at Elmwood, an accessible, supportive housing community designed for individuals with disabilities, gave Ed a new sense of home and independence. Since then, Ed has embraced wheelchair sports with passion and purpose. He's earned gold medals at the National Veterans Wheelchair Games in 2024 and 2025 and plans to compete again in 2026.

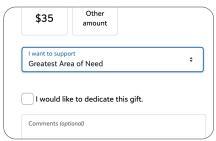

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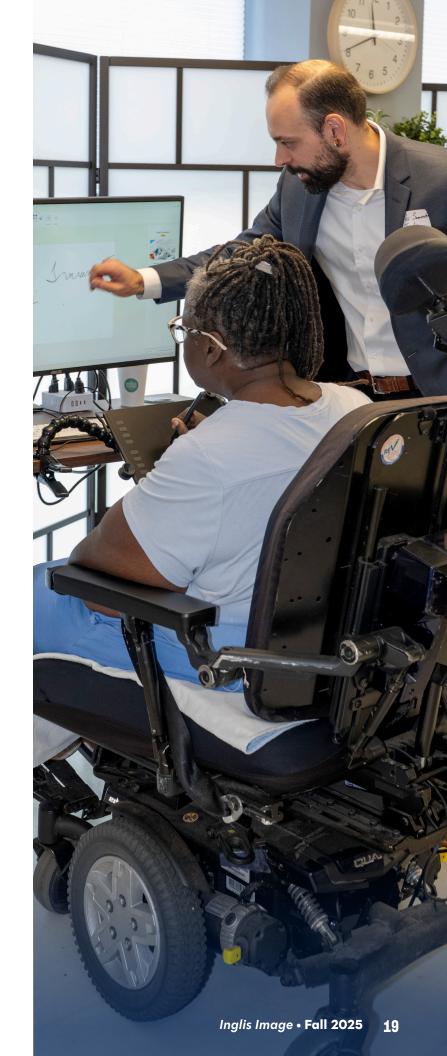

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Flowing Through It: How Employment Services Support Clients, Their Confidence, and New Career Opportunities

or over 20 years, Inglis Employment
Services (IES) program has helped people
with disabilities prepare and connect
with the job opportunities that emphasize their
talents and passions. IES works with every client
to create a customized employment plan that
addresses any challenges or barriers they're

experiencing; and aligns their goals with the careers they want to pursue. For people like Ethan Reilly, Inglis' Employment program helped create a clearer path for his professional pursuits. A graduate of Vanderbilt University—with a dual degree in public policy and engineering science—Ethan has a deep passion

for conservation work and creating a cleaner environment for those in his community and beyond. Early in his adult life he was diagnosed with severe social anxiety and depression; the experience at one point became so debilitating that he withdrew from his career to recover. Overtime with therapeutic supports, Ethan was ready to return to work but wasn't keen on the first steps to take. That's when he learned about the employment resources offered through the Pennsylvania Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) from his therapist.

In Pennsylvania OVR provides individualized workforce development to people with physical,

mental, intellectual, or emotional impairment disabilities— by connecting them with employment organizations near their homes. Inglis Employment Services received Ethan's case, and introduced him to Lekan Ogungbeni, the Employment Specialist that would support the next step in his professional journey. "He was really wonderful;" shared Reilly. "He talked me through what my goals were,

[and] what I thought I might want to focus on in our sessions."

Lekan met with Ethan 1-2 times a week at his local library to support him through tailoring his resume, applying for jobs, and run through mock interviews. Overtime as Ethan would get invited for interviews Lekan would adapt their practice interviews as much as possible to mimic the questions that Ethan might be asked about specific positions he was pursuing. The practice paid off and Ethan landed a role as a Science Technician at the Philadelphia Water Department at its Northeast Wastewater Pollution Control Plant. In his day-to-day work he performs tests to ensure that the excess water treated at the

Plant is processed thoroughly enough to safely be released back into the Delaware River. While the IES program does offer additional continued coaching support for anyone who needs it after acquiring a job; Ethan felt confident navigating his new role independently. "He was there for me, and I ended up really enjoying the work and taking to it like a 'fish to water,'" shared Reilly. "I didn't actually need to follow-up with Lekan, but what he really did is he formed that bridge for me."

Nearly a year into his new role, Ethan's in his element, but still has dreams of furthering his career in environmental governance possibly

as a policy analyst and may even pursue his master's degree in public policy. When he reflects on his journey back to establishing his career—it was Inglis Employment Services that helped remind him that he has the skills to take on any step or opportunity he seeks. "[At times] I'm going to feel like my path forward is uncertain," shared Reilly. "But what I know now is that I can rely on that ability to

grow and meet the moment, right? That's what working with Lekan proved to me." ●
